

OCIA SELF-GUIDED RECONCILIATION RETREAT

As you prepare for upcoming baptism and/or confirmation, please follow the process described carefully and prayerfully. When you are ready, please contact the OCIA director to schedule a time for your first confession.

1. Review the *Forgiven* series on formed.org.

2. If you have not already done so, please review chapter 18 in the USCCB adult catechism on the sacrament of penance and reconciliation.

3. Prayerfully read the following passages of scripture. Reflect on the people and situations they describe and how they relate to sinfulness, confession, forgiveness, approaching God, and our place within the body of Christ.

Luke 5.1-11

Matthew 18.15-35

1 John 1.5-2.11

Hebrews 4.12-16; 10.19-25; 12.1-13

2 Corinthians 5.16-21

4. Use the included examinations to reflect on your life and actions, asking the Holy Spirit to illuminate those things in your life that need to be brought to God for forgiveness.

Remember to think about your past and anything that continues to bind you with guilt and regret. Make note of those things you want to remember to confess, and feel free to take that list with you when you enter confession.

5. Consider memorizing the following prayers.

You may bring a copy of the act of contrition to your confession. Your penance may include praying the Hail Mary and Our Father, which should be done as soon as possible after leaving confession. Again, you may bring a missal with those prayers (or have them with you in another form), but entering into intimate prayer with God is often facilitated by having those prayers committed to memory.

Act of contrition

My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good,

I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin.

Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy. Amen.

Hail Mary

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee.

Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Our Father (The Lord's Prayer)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

The Way of Darkness (Sin):

The Seven Capital Sins

- 1. Pride: Preoccupation with one's own
- excellence or misery.

 2. Avarice/Greed: Disordered desire for possessions; setting our hearts on material things: selfishness
- Lust: Disordered desire for or inordinate enjoyment of sexual pleasure.
- A. Anger: Uncontrolled emotion which results in desire for revenge; holding resentment.

 5. Gluttony: Putting the pleasures of the body (food, drink, makeup, Internet, TV, etc.) over the goods of the soul.
- 6. Envy: Sadness at the good of another
- 7. Sloth: Bodily or Spiritual laziness or neglect.

Sins Against the Theological Virtues

- Presumption on God's Mercy.
 Despair of God's Mercy.
- 3. Resisting and/or Attacking the known truth.
- 4. Envy at another's spiritual good.
- 5. Obstinacy in sin.
- 6. Final impenitence (refusal to repent).

Sins Crying to Heaven

- 1. Willful murder.
- 2. Sodomy.
- Oppression of the poor.
- Defrauding laborers of their wages.

Being an Accessory to Another's Sin

- 1. By counsel.
- 2. By command.
- 3. By consent. 4. By provocation
- 5. By praise or flattery.
- 6. By concealment.
- 7. By partaking
- By defense of the sinful action.

The Works of the Flesh (Gal. 5:19-21)

Immorality, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, hatreds, rivalry, jealousy, outbursts of fury, acts of selfishness, dissensions, factions, occasions of envy, drinking bouts, orgies.

The Way of Light (Holiness):

The Seven Capital Virtues 1. Humility: Acknowledgment of truth about

- God, oneself and others
- Generosity: Doing actions for the benefit of others; selflessness.
- Chastity: Proper integration of sexuality within the human person according to the mind of God and one's state in life.
- 4. Meekness: Gentleness of spirit that gives
- power of self-possession; governs anger.

 5. Temperance: Moderation of the desire for
- 6. **Brotherly Love:** Desire for the true good of one's neighbor, which leads one to act rightly
- 7. Diligence: Consistency in doing what is right.

The Theological Virtues

The Cardinal Virtues

Prudence, Justice, Temperance and Fortitude.

The Corporal Works of Mercy

To feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, visit the imprisoned, shelter the homeless, visit the sick and bury the dead.

The Spiritual Works of Mercy

To admonish the sinner, instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, comfort the sorrowful, bear wrongs patiently, forgive all injuries and pray for the living and the dead.

The Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety, and Fear of the Lord.

The Fruits of the Holy Spirit

(Gal. 5:22-23)

Charity, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Generosity, Gentleness, Faithfulness, Modesty, Self-Control and Chastity.

The Beatitudes

- 1. Blessed are the poor in spirit; for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven
- Blessed are the meek; for they shall possess the land.

The Ten Commandments

- I. I am the Lord Thy God. Thou shall not have strange gods before Me.
- II. Thou shall not take the Name of the Lord thy
- God in vain.

 III. Remember to keep holy the Lord's Day.
- IV. Honor thy father and thy mother
- V. Thou shall not kill. VI. Thou shall not commit adulters
- VII. Thou shall not steal.
- VIII. Thou shall not bear false witness.
- IX. Thou shall not covet thy neighbor's wife. X. Thou shall not covet thy neighbor's goods

The Two Greatest Commandments

- I. You shall love the Lord your God with you whole heart, with your whole soul and with
- II. You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

The Precepts of the Church

- 1. You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on Holy Days of Obligation and rest from servile labor
- You shall confess your sins at least once a year
- 3. You shall receive the Sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter Sea
- 4. You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church.

Prayer Before Confession Come, Holy Spirit, enlighten my mind that I may clearly know my sins. Move my heart that I may be sincerely sorry for them, honestly confess them and firmly resolve sorty for them, including the sort of Wisdom, grant me to see the malice of sin and my ingratitude toward You, the all-loving God. Spirit of Fortitude, help me to make whatever sacrifice is needed to avoid sin in the future

A Brief Examination of Conscience

Based on the Ten Commandments

I am the LORD your God: you shall not have strange Gods before me.

Have I treated people, events, or things as more important than God?

You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain.

Have my words, actively or passively, put down God, the Church, or people?

Remember to keep holy the LORD's Day.

Do I go to Mass every Sunday (or Saturday Vigil) and on Holy Days of Obligation (Jan. 1; the Ascension; Aug. 15; Nov. 1; Dec. 8; Dec. 25)? Do I avoid, when possible, work that impedes worship to God, joy for the Lord's Day, and proper relaxation of mind and body? Do I look for ways to spend time with family or in service on Sunday?

Honor your father and your mother.

Do I show my parents due respect? Do I seek to maintain good communication with my parents where possible? Do I criticize them for lacking skills I think they should have?

You shall not kill.

Have I harmed another through physical, verbal, or emotional means, including gossip or manipulation of any kind?

You shall not commit adultery.

Have I respected the physical and sexual dignity of others and of myself?

You shall not steal.

Have I taken or wasted time or resources that belonged to another?



Celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

Have I gossiped, told lies, or embellished stories at the expense of another?

You shall not covet your neighbor's spouse.

Have I honored my spouse with my full affection and exclusive love?

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

Am I content with my own means and needs, or do I compare myself to others unnecessarily?

Christ's Two Commandments

How well do we love God and others? Do we love as Christ calls us to? In the Gospel of Matthew, Christ gives us Two Commandments: "He said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments'" (Mt 22:37-40).

Not sure what love is? St. Paul describes it for us in his Letter to the Corinthians. Is this how you love God and others? "Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, [love] is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails" (1 Cor 13:4-8).
